IDEIA:

Individuals with Disabilities Education Improvement Act (Formally IDEA)

- + Federal legislation that is designed to ensure that students with disabilities (ages 3-21) are provided with a free and appropriate public education.
- + The six main elements of the legislation are:
 - Individualized Education Program (IEP)
 - + Free and Appropriate Public Education (FAPE)
 - + Least Restrictive Environment (LRE)
 - + Evaluation
 - + Parent and Teacher Participation
 - + Procedural Safeguards

FAPE: Free and Appropriate Public Education

- One of the key elements of IDEIA. States may enact higher standards but, at minimum, must comply with the federal standard which requires that special education and related services are:
 - + Provided at public expense under public supervision
 - Meet the standards set by the State Education Agency (SEA)
 - Incorporated in pre-school, elementary school and secondary school
 - + Are provided in conformity with the student's IEP

LRE: Least Restrictive Environment

- A student with a disability should be educated in a setting that provides the student a chance to work and learn with students without disabilities to the greatest extent possible while still meeting the child's unique learning needs.
- + IDEIA's strong preference is to educate students in regular classes with appropriate aides and supports.

PPT: Planning and Placement Team

- There are several reasons to convene a Planning and Placement Team meeting (annual review, review evaluations and determine continuing eligibility, review/revise IEP, etc.).
- Required members of the team include: parents, general education teacher, special education teacher, representative from the district who knows of available resources, an individual who can interpret evaluation results and the child (when appropriate).
- Many changes to the IEP cannot be made without convening a PPT, though some more minor changes can be done through an amendment with the consent of the parent.

IEP: Individualized Education Program

- An IEP is a written statement for each child with a disability that is developed, reviewed and revised during a PPT meeting held at least yearly to provide students with a free and appropriate public education. The IEP includes:
 - + Prior Written Notice, which outlines actions taken or refused by the PPT
 - + Present levels of academic achievement and functional performance
 - + Outlines strengths, concerns and impact of disability in each area
 - + A statement of measurable annual goals and related objectives
 - + How progress toward meeting the annual goals/objectives will be measured
 - + When progress reports will be provided
 - + Necessary modifications and accommodations
 - State and district testing and accommodations
 - + Transition planning, when appropriate
 - + Special education and related services
